



But death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over those who did not sin after the pattern of the trespass of Adam, who is the type of the one who was to come. For if by the transgression of the one the many died, how much more did the grace of God and the gracious gift of the one man Jesus Christ overflow for the many.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

TUE, JUN 23 is the CELEBRATION OF MIDSUMMER EVE.

For centuries, Midsummer was one of the most important festivals of the year. And why not? The return of summer is a good reason for rejoicing. It is said that anyone who goes out this night in search of mystery will not be disappointed.

Tonight is the eve of the birth of St. John the Baptist - the summer nativity. John's 2 great emblems, fire and water, unite in the celebrations.

In many places, St. John's fires sparkle on the mountains and hilltops. In Montreal, Canada, a communion of bonfires is lighted along both sides of the St. Lawrence River. In parts of France everyone in town contributes at least a twig for the bonfire. In some places people gather around their bonfires to sing hymns and say a prayer in honor of St. John. Later fires in homes are lit from the communal bonfire.

Irish farmers toss burning sticks from the bonfire into their gardens. In Norway farmers jump over the flames with a merry wish that their grain might grow as high as they jump. In many countries, lovers leap over the fire holding hands.

In San Juan, Puerto Rico, named after St. John, people take a dip in the Caribbean Sea between midnight and dawn to honor John the Baptist. Bonfires along the beaches light their way.

What is a Sponsor Certificate and How is One Obtained?

A sponsor certificate verifies that a person belongs to a particular parish and attends SUN Mass regularly there. The certificate also verifies that someone fulfills all the Church requirements to be a sponsor for Baptism and Confirmation, including age, the completion of the Sacraments of Initiation, and if married. being in a valid marriage. A sponsor certificate can be obtained by calling the DeVivo Centre at 628-6840 or the Brady Centre at 277-4236. Sometimes when a person is asked to be a sponsor, he or she is not sure of this role or the Church's expectations. This becomes an opportunity for us to learn once again the meaning behind some of the Church's practices. Those who are choosing sponsors are advised to choose carefully.



MBERSHUP WHO IS CONSIDERED A PARISHIONER?

asked how we define who is a parishioner of one of our parishes. A parishioner is someone who:

- ♦ Is baptized Catholic
- Is a registered member of Immaculate Conception, St. Aloysius, St. John or St. Rita
- ◆ Participates in the faith community of our parishes by regular attendance of Mass here

If you are currently registered with your parents but are 18 or older, you must register independently.

Those who are not registered and who do not actively participate in the parish faith community are not considered members. Baptism at any of our 4 parishes does not mean you are automatically considered a lifelong member.

WED, JUN 24 is the Birth of John the Baptist, Midsummer Day.

During the great cycle of the Christian year, there are 3 festivals in celebration of a person's birth: John the Baptist, Mary, and Jesus. These are the holy ones who were filled with the Spirit even before their birth.

Keep in mind that in the liturgy of the Church, a "nativity" is not a birthday. Birthdays are anniversaries of a birth. Instead, a nativity is the birth itself. Today is not John the Baptist's birthday. Today John is born.



Rejoicing at John's birth is a commandment of the gospel. Even the angel Gabriel tells us to rejoice. Jesus himself praises John the Baptist.

The feast of John's birth was established very early in the Church's history, at about the same time as the feast of Christmas. Luke tells us that the angel Gabriel announced the conception of Jesus 6 months after announcing the conception of John. So the date of this feast is 6 months before Christmas.

The old customs that centered around the summer solstice became ways to honor John. In some parts of the world, some people stay up all night to burn St. John's fires. And the celebration goes on all day as well.

In Poland, wreaths lit with candles are tossed into streams to float down river. In Morocco Muslims light fires to celebrate John's birth. The Muslim Holy Book, the Koran, calls John a great prophet.

In Sweden, doors and vehicles are decorated with green twigs. Maypoles are decorated with wreaths and then hoisted up amid shouts of joy. In Lithuania a round cheese sweetened with honey is prepared to look like the sun. The honey is a reminder of one of the foods John ate in the desert.

Sonora Louise Smart Dodd of Spokane WA, thought that her father, William Smart, had done a remarkable thing: A veteran of the Civil War, he raised 6 children alone on the family farm after his wife died in childbirth. When Miss Dodd suggested a day for fathers in 1909,



she meant it to be a church service, like Mother's Day had originally been. Public interest in establishing Father's Day was strong at once, in both the United States and Canada. Father's Day became an official national day of recognition in 1966.

HERE ARE SOME SUGGESTIONS ON HOW TO HONOR OUR FATHERS:

- Sit down as a family and write one thing you learned from your father, what each one of you admires most about him, and a favorite memory you have of him. Then share them with your father.
- If your father is not present, write your memories in a notebook. Add photographs of those times.
 Send it to him.
- If your father has died or you are estranged from him, be with him in prayer. Form a picture of him in your imagination as if he were sitting in front of you. Share your thoughts and feelings, your hopes and hurts, and listen as if he is answering. Become aware of God's presence in your heart and in the heart of your father.
- A fun and easy way to honor fathers is by praising their children. This helps them know they are doing a good job.

SUN, JUN 21, 2020 12TH SUN IN ORDINARY TIME Romans 5:12-15 THE POWER OF GRACE

"The gift is not like the transgression," St. Paul told the Romans. Grace is not like sin. Not at all. Grace is much more powerful than sin.

And sin can be pretty bad. Paul reminds the Romans that sin entered the world through one man, Adam. And through sin came death. Adam's sin affects every human being. But let us be honest. Everybody's sin affects everybody else. Any time any one of us sins, we hurt the entire human race.

Sin is powerfully bad, but grace is even more powerfully good. Paul contrasts the sin of Adam with the grace of Christ. There is no comparison. Yes, sin affects every human being. Yes, sin makes us look

bad. But grace also affects every human being, and grace overpowers sin, making us look better than good. Through the grace of Christ, God prepares us for eternal salvation. It is a good far beyond imagining.

The remorse we feel for the sin we commit is a healthy emotion. It deters us from sinning again. It reminds us of the hurt we cause others when we misbehave.

But the joy we feel in the presence of Christ is even healthier, because it affirms the goodness by which we were made and even more the goodness by which we are redeemed.

In the spiritual life, we admit that we have sinned. But we rejoice that we are saved. The gift is not like the transgression.
