

When Pope Benedict XVI visited the US in 2008, tens of thousands gathered in Yankee Stadium to celebrate the Eucharist with him. What made them different from all the other excited crowds who have assembled there through the years? When they began to sing together, to listen together, to pray together, they ceased to be a crowd, and became a liturgical assembly. It was not where they were but what they did that set them apart.

The Gospels speak of many instances when Jesus prayed alone to his Father. But Jesus also put a special value on communal prayer. "Where two or three are gathered together in my name," he told his disciples, "there am I in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20). Jesus gave his own mission to his followers, sending them forth to do everything he did: to heal, to teach, to proclaim the kingdom. Jesus wants us to meet God in and through each other. So the Christian community continues to gather, Sunday after Sunday. When we get up on Sunday morning and come to Mass, we respond to Jesus' invitation, and we express our trust in his promise that whenever we come together, he comes, too.

### NATIVITY SCENE

The tradition of having some kind of Nativity scene, also known by its



French name "crèche", in our churches and homes evolved during the Middle Ages, first in churches as a prop for Nativity plays associated with Mass. A crèche is a reproduction of the cave in Bethlehem with images of Mary, Joseph and Infant Jesus in a manager, shepherds and animals, angels and Magi. St. Francis of Assisi popularized this custom with a living Nativity scene in Greccio, Italy in 1223. Please visit the Nativity in our churches.

### THE FULLNESS OF ADVENT - THE FULLNESS OF CHRIST THE PROMISED MESSIAH

"God is so wonderful!" "Look at what God did!" God came near to us "on the wings of Christmas angels," was born in a manger, and walked the dusty roads of Galilee amidst humble, ordinary people.

Are these words too exuberant? Are they permissible only with poetic license? Are they too flowing to be accepted at face value?

If it seems so, it is only because no words are adequate to describe how the God who inspired ancient prophets, particularly Isaiah, filled the hearts of the people of Israel with a vision of one whom God would send to deliver them. The promise of a coming Messiah gave them hope.

It might appear that this Messiah was coming only to the Jews, but later we find Isaiah saying that Israel is to be a light to the nations, so the light that the Messiah brings is to be shared with everyone. All of us stand alongside the people of ancient Israel listening to the prophet's words and promises.

What did Isaiah have in mind when he spoke of the light that was to come and the messianic hope in general?

The attributes that stand out are universal qualities: a counselor, a person of peace, justice and righteousness. Also listed are qualities of wisdom and understanding. Such qualities may be found in many fine people who have lived throughout the centuries and many who are alive right now. In a sense, all of these people might be seen as messiahs, sharing the light and creating holiness within our common life. Prophecy can be fulfilled in many ways and

fulfilled again and again.
However,
Jesus stands out. He is a full revelation, a unique, living portrayal of the nature of our eternal God. This is the best



Christmas gift, one that can provide inspiration, guidance and joy throughout our days.

### SUN, DEC 20, 2020 ROMANS 16:25-27 A GREAT ENDING

A good story has a great ending. It features good characters, a fanciful setting, and an interesting plot with a good share of twists. But

it needs an ending that pulls everything together - sometimes with a surprise.

God has written a good story with a great ending. The story appeared not in a few chapters but in thousands of years of human history. For all those generations, people were waiting on God to fulfill a promise. They believed in their hearts that one day God would deliver, but they did not know when or how.

The ending of the story was the beginning of Christianity: the birth of Jesus Christ. Jesus entered human history as our Messiah. He was not

what believers were expecting - he seemed like less, yet he was much more. He seemed like a mere vulnerable human, born in poverty, killed in dishonor. But he was more. He was the Son of God, born human like each of us, crucified for our sins - and risen from the dead.

St. Paul says God kept this mystery secret for long ages, like the surprise ending to a good book. The prophets gave clues to what the ending would be, but God revealed it much later in time. God made this good news known not just to the children of the covenant - the people who were reading the book - but to all the nations of the world. The God who did that, Paul says, deserves our praise.
