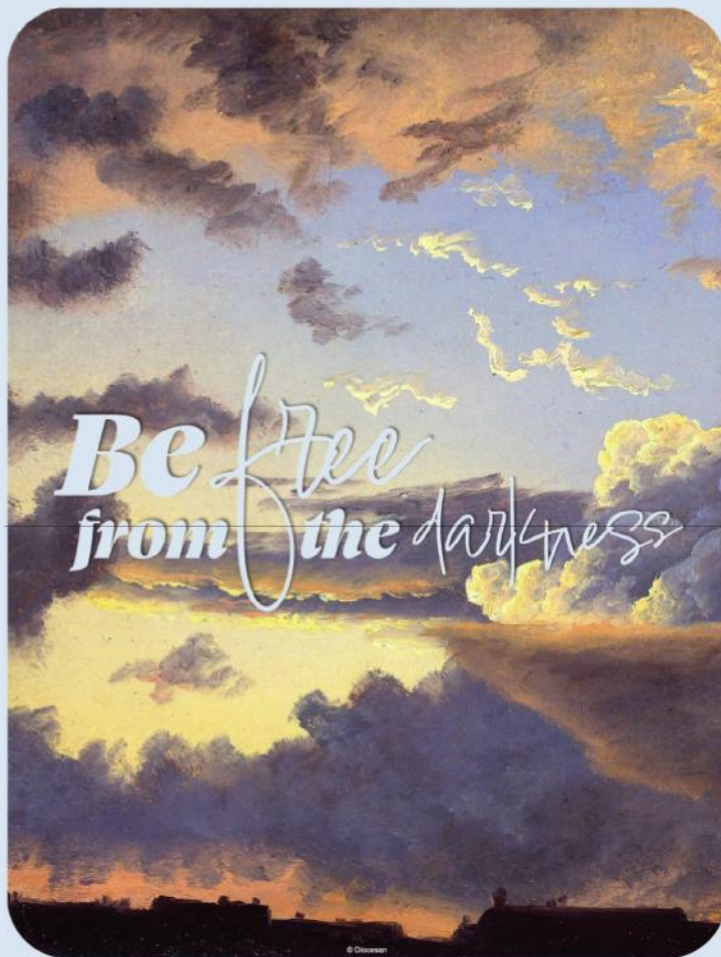

Whoever will not listen to my words which he speaks in my name, I myself will make him answer for it. But if a prophet presumes to speak in my name an oracle that I have not commanded him to speak, or speaks in the name of other gods, he shall die."

SECOND READING: I CORINTHIANS 7:32-35

Brothers and sisters: I should like you to be free of anxieties. An unmarried man is anxious about the things of the Lord, how he may please the Lord. But a married man is anxious about the things of the world, how he may please his wife, and he is divided. An unmarried woman or a virgin is anxious about the things of the Lord, so that she may be holy in both body and spirit. A married woman, on the other hand, is anxious about the things of the world, how she may please her husband. I am telling you this for your own benefit, not to impose a restraint upon you, but for the sake of propriety and adherence to the Lord without distraction.

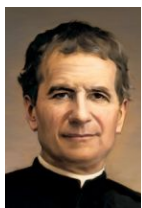

WED, JAN 31 IS THE FEAST DAY OF ST. JOHN BOSCO. John was born in a small village in the Piedmont region of Italy. His father died when John

was only 2, leaving the family very poor. When John went away to seminary at age 18, even his clothes were donated by villagers. John decided his ministry would be in Turin, the closest city to his village. There teenage boys would leave their poor families in the countryside searching for work, and come into town where they lived in terrible conditions. Even before his ordination John began taking a group of boys out to the country every Sunday for sports, a picnic, song and prayer. When John became a priest he housed boys who had nowhere to live, and began to train them as shoemakers, tailors and printers. The training protected them from a harsh world around them. John called forth the best in these boys by affirming them and treating them kindly. The number of young people in John's care grew ever larger. He had trouble finding assistants who understood his gentle teaching methods. Eventually he began an order of priests and an order of sisters. He also started a group of laypeople called Cooperators. All were trained especially for this work.

Today these orders serve in schools, colleges, seminaries, hospitals and missions all over the world.

Please be advised that Bishop Kulick has given permission to re-institute receiving the Precious Blood of Christ from the cup on the first weekend of Lent, which is FEB 17th and 18th.

We will implement this practice on the Vigil and Sunday Masses on those days, and continue at every weekend Mass.

We will NOT implement receiving from the cup on weekday Masses at this time.

I ask all Eucharistic Ministers to be aware of this, as we will need to increase the number of ministers at each weekend Mass. *Fr. Paul*

GROUNDHOG DAY ("AMERICA'S 2ND FAVORITE HOLIDAY" - A SAYING IN PUNXSUTAWNEY, PA)
Candlemas Day is associated with folklore about the arrival of spring, or at least the arrival of lengthening days. German farmers say that on Candlemas the badger interrupts its winter nap to check the weather. If the day is sunny the badger sees its shadow, gets scared, and goes back to hibernate for 6 more weeks. But if the badger cannot see its shadow due to cloudy weather, spring is about to arrive. German farmers who immigrated to PA did not find badgers, so they decided that groundhogs would provide the spring forecast instead. So on Candlemas Day we wonder if the groundhog will see its shadow or if spring is coming soon.

JAN 28, 2024 4TH SUN IN ORDINARY TIME THUNDERBOLTS AND LIGHTNING

One of the most difficult duties of a disciple is to follow the command of Jesus to spread the gospel to all nations. (Lk 24:47, Mk 116:15, Mt 28:19) I think one reason may be that we don't feel we have the authority to tell someone else what to believe. Most of us don't think we know the gospel well enough to preach it. Or we are so afraid of offending atheists, that we use that fear as an excuse to say nothing. But being a disciple means following Jesus. The gospel this Sunday mentions twice that Jesus taught with more authority than any of the religious leaders of Israel. So how can we get such authority? First, Jesus didn't get his authority from winning a Messiah election. And he didn't threaten people with thunderbolts and lightning. He certainly didn't impress people by saying what they wanted to hear. He spoke the truth that he heard from his Father. His two main actions in his ministry were curing and forgiving people. Since the Jews thought sickness was a punishment for sins, by curing the

sick and forgiving sins, Jesus showed that God loves even sinners. And those actions showed that Jesus got authority from his Father. "But you still haven't answered the question: How do we get that authority?" We get it from the Holy Spirit, in Baptism and Confirmation. And like an athlete, who may be born with strength and abilities, yet has to work-out and practice to be any good, we still need to grow in that authority. One way is to read the scriptures and pray with them, so that we get to know God through his Word and begin to listen to him in our prayers. We can consciously decide to see God in other people, not just those we love, but everyone, even the ones who annoy us. (And especially the ones who challenge us to be more loving, patient and forgiving.) Most parishes have programs that encourage sharing your faith, such as RCIA, Christ Renews his Parish, etc. And of course, the Eucharist and other sacraments strengthen God's life in us. You'll know you have that authority when you can talk about your faith with confidence instead of hesitation, because you will be speaking from experience, not second hand knowledge.

FRI, FEB 2 IS THE FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD OR CANDLEMAS DAY.

It is 40 days after Christmas. In many places the nativity scene is left up until then. On this day it is decorated with the first flowers of spring before it is taken down and put away. We celebrate a joyful event told in the 2nd chapter of Luke. When Jesus was 40 days old, Mary and Joseph took Him to the Temple of Jerusalem to present Him to the Lord. In the Temple, He was recognized by Anna and Simeon, 2 elderly people of great holiness. They were filled with joy. Simeon

took Jesus in his arms. Old age embraced youth. Simeon spoke a beautiful prayer. Now that he saw the Messiah, he could die in peace. Simeon also spoke of the sadness to come, which would pierce the heart of Mary. Someone called Jesus "a light to the nations". The light of His presence in the world has been celebrated on this day for many centuries. Traditionally on this feast day enough candles were blessed to last all year. That's why it is



commonly called "Candlemas". It is a feast of light. At church everyone joins in singing Simeon's song. In some parishes, the people light the candles and carry them all around the church and even out into the streets. We can carry the light of Christ to every corner of the world. We will also bless candles at our Masses and anyone wishing to have blessed candles for home may purchase them after Mass for a donation of \$3. Blessed candles in our churches and homes signify the living presence of Christ among us. With Christ as our light, we warm a lost and wintry world.



SAT, FEB 3 IS THE FEAST OF ST. BLAISE, BISHOP/MARTYR

Blaise was a bishop of Sebaste in Armenia. He was martyred during the persecution of Christians by the Roman emperor, Lucinius. Blaise is said to have been a physician, as well as a bishop.

Legend tells us that Blaise saved the life of a boy who was choking on a fish bone. He is now the patron saint

of all who have diseases of the throat. On his feast day in many US parishes, people have their throats blessed. It's no surprise that this custom coincides with the peak of the sore throat and flu season. Before the discovery of penicillin, a person could die from complications of a sore throat.

A tradition of blessing throats began at a time when the church's calendar was filled with blessings for the saints' days. Many of these are no longer practiced, but the custom of blessing the throats

remains. Two candles are tied in the shape of a cross and then are touched to one's neck. We can think of the blessing of our throats as a sign of God's care for every part of us.



There will be a morning Mass at St. John this SAT, FEB 3 at 9.

Throats will be blessed during this Mass. Since the Feast of St. Blaise falls on a SAT this year, we will also bless throats after SAT's vigil Mass.

**Annually, our diocese participates in
THE COLLECTION FOR THE CHURCH IN CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE
on the 1st weekend in FEB, this year being FEB 3/4.**

Proceeds from this collection help the Church bring light to many nations such as Croatia, the Czech Republic, Poland, Serbia, Slovakia and Ukraine, who need help rebuilding after more than 70 years of Soviet rule and oppression. Although the tyranny of communism did not snuff out the Catholic faith in these countries, their people do need our help to "Restore the Church and build the Future" on their own.

Because of the generous response from parishioners in past years, the Bishops of the US were able to provide immediate aid to Ukraine when Russia attacked that nation nearly 2 years ago. The Bishops of the US continue to supply aid to Ukraine, but also desire to help other nations in Central and Eastern Europe. Funds from this collection will support other reconstruction projects, education, clergy/religious/laity formation, and those facing poverty.
