Exodus 17:8-13 RAISING HANDS IN PRAYER

When people find it hard to pray, they seek ways to improve. Sometimes a simple change can bring great benefits to our prayer.

Most people derive benefit from prayer if they get into the right routine. For example, the celebration of the Eucharist always follows the same outline. The predictability of the structure allows people to enter into the prayer. Some young people express frustration about the repetitive nature of the mass, and that is understandable. But it takes time with the repetition to let the mystery of the mass sink into one's spirit. Once it does, the repetition provides a framework out of which people can pray.

Prayer at home can be improved through routine as well. Many people find it helpful to pick a certain time of day when they will go to pray. Others find a certain place they can use - whether it is a room or a particular chair. The selection of time and place provides the structure in which prayer can happen.

Posture can also help prayer. Some people kneel. Others sit. Early Christians stood for prayer and lifted their hands aloft. The priest still uses this posture when he prays at mass.

It is similar to the posture taken by Moses when Amalek waged war against Israel. As long as Moses' hands were outstretched, Israel had the better of the fight.

If we are fighting at prayer, a minor adjustment in place, time, or posture might help.

After my son was born, a good friend of mine created wood carvings with Scriptural verses on them for each one of my children. He simply requested that I would choose one Scripture passage each for Ava, Noel, and Andrew. The verse that I chose for my oldest daughter Ava was that of the second reading today from Saint Paul to Timothy; "Remain faithful to what you have learned and believed, because you know from whom you learned it, and that from infancy you have known the Sacred Scriptures, which are capable of giving you wisdom for salvation through faith in Christ **Jesus."** The reason I selected this particular verse for Ava was simple; she is the oldest and as such, is extremely stubborn AND thinks she knows it all (the only reason I can tell you this without her killing me is that she is 8 and does not have the desire to read what Mommy writes in the bulletin)! Ava always has the answer, and if she doesn't...she makes it up. She is, however, a natural born leader. She can get her way simply by nagging you... to death. She will not stop until you hear her side of an argument, and she will not give up arguing until you admit that she actually has a point! In other words, she is **EXACTLY** what Paul tells us all Christians should be; persistent. In fact, if all 3 readings from this weekend could be summed up in one word, it would be persistence! **PERSISTENCE:** The quality that allows someone to continue doing something or trying to do something even though it is difficult or op-

Paul tells us, "be persistent whether it is convenient OR inconvenient." What a challenge! Unfortunately,

many of us are not as willful as Miss Ava Sampey, and lack the ability to truly be persistent. When faced with any adversity, too often we give up! Being persistent is difficult for many reasons. For one, most of us, including myself, are chronic people pleasers. We simply want everyone to get along. There have been so many times when I feel very passionate about something, but cannot express it to my friends and family because I do not want to offend them! Fortunately, as of late the Holy Spirit HAS given me the ability to be persistent when it comes to the truth of who lesus Christ is and calls us to be. Although MANY times it is EX-TREMELY inconvenient for me to do so, I can honestly say I do NOT care who I offend when speaking about the love of Jesus Christ! I fully realize this is NOT MY work, but the work of the Holy Spirit living and speaking through me. So how can WE in the Our Lady Queen of the Yough Community continue to develop persistence as followers of Jesus?

How to develop Persistence as Disciples:

- I. We must have a definite purpose:
 What is our purpose as disciples? To bring others to Jesus Christ! When we talk about purpose, another word comes to mind: desire. Our purpose must be backed up by a burning desire for its fulfillment. We simply cannot stop being a witness because it is "too hard." Our hearts must literally be on fire for the Lord!
 - 2. We must have a definite plan expressed in continuous action. What is our plan? It can be seen in our vision: "To lead all whose lives we touch into a living relationship with the person of Jesus Christ through Word and Sacrament, service and fellowship." What is continuous

- about it? Well, you may have noticed that we are extremely persistent and intentional in repeating our vision over and over AND over again, until ALL are utterly sick of hearing it and will hopefully GO DO IT!
- 3. We must have a mind closed tightly against negative and discouraging influences. There will always be "naysayers." People love to have something to complain or gossip about. Either they just don't "get it," or they are not ready to accept the fact that we MUST have a living relationship with the person of Jesus Christ. However, WE must remain steadfast and KNOW that our plan is in line with God's will! If we are following the will of God, we must stop allowing negative forces to affect the work.
- 4. We must have a friendly alliance with one or more persons who will encourage us to follow through with both plan and purpose. There are so many days we ALL just want to give up. No one is listening. No one cares. At times I feel as though some would be extremely content with simply being "pew warmers," so why even bother? But our community is meant to also inspire us, and I have found great inspiration in countless numbers of parishioners who live for Jesus Christ and firmly believe in the work we are doing here in the Jewel!

If only ALL of us could have a little more "Ava" inside of us! Think of what we could accomplish! I want to challenge you to be persistent for Christ. Never stop desiring to bring others to Him! May the Holy Spirit start a fire in our soul that will never be extinguished.

I spent much of my afternoon yesterday (i.e. last Monday) with two women dying from cancer. That may seem depressing to you. In fact,

it had quite the opposite effect on me. As I watched one of the women labor to breathe, my heart was filled not with sorrow or despair but of hopefulness and joy.

Let me explain before I sound cruel. Prior to going on these visits, I was enjoying some R&R at the rectory. Much of my relaxation involves browsing the internet and checking the news. Oh, the news! It can get me so easily flustered and out of sorts. What's going on in our country? What's going on in our church? What's going on in our world? And what on earth is going on with the Steelers? It all seems to be spiraling out of control. And the message repeats itself ad nausium because we are willing to listen. As I was lying there contemplating these terrible times with apocalyptic thoughts, I wanted to just stay rolled up in my blanket. Then the office contacted me about visiting these two women as they lay dying - one wanted anointed and the other just a visit. I did not want to leave the rectory. I didn't' even want to move. It was cold! I had a full stomach and was comfortable. But duty called and I (reluctantly) answered. As I visited with these families, I realized that my heart was being moved. As I heard about the goodness of the one lying there, their involvement in

caring for their families, and their love of the Lord, something was happening within me. I saw the love in the eyes of family members who watched as one they loved slowly slipped away from them, every moment possibly signifying passage onto the next stage of their journey, every breath possibly their last. And it hit me as I sat and held the second woman's hand. It was a powerful sense of hopefulness and joy.

I was experiencing in that moment the realization of a life well lived. There have been prognosticators of doom in every age. I hear so often on the news and online that "it's never been this bad before" and I'm often tempted to believe it. But it has been this bad before: when God himself hung on the cross and only one of the apostles and a handful of women stood by him. Nothing will be as terrible as that day. And God turned that day upside-down three days later. Our greatest moment of despair became our greatest reason for hope.

None of us ever reach perfection in this life, but there are so many people who live well and die quietly without recognition or real appreciation. These seemed to be two such women – people you will never hear about on the news. How many others around us are silently living well, loving God and neighbor, never perfectly but faithfully?

Our tablets, smart phones, televisions, and computer screens may be windows to the world, but those windows contain tinted glass that can cast a pale yellow or a murky brown coloring over everything that is out there. We only ever hear about the bad stuff.

When I walked out of my house that day, I removed the filter and saw what was really there – beautiful green grass, a crisp breeze, and a great deal of goodness in the people of Fayette County.

I'm convinced that human existence is a paradox. In moments when the only thing we want to do is shrivel up in a ball and forget about the world, the very thing we need to do is get out there and actually encounter it. Being with people, good salt-of-the-earth light-of-the-world people, is enough to melt the tint off of any glasses we might be wearing.

So when you feel down, reach out to someone. Make a phone call, have lunch, or go for a walk. Then take off those tinted goggles and just enjoy the view.
