Providing for the safety and welfare of the faithful has necessitated many modifications to our ritual practices.



To reduce the risk of transmitting the coronavirus, it is not permitted this year to "sign" the faithful with ashes in the customary fashion. Rather, on Ash Wednesday the tradition of being marked with ashes will take place in a different fashion, through a Sprinkling with Ashes.

Sprinkling with Ashes is a custom observed in many countries throughout the world. The minister, using their thumb and index finger, secures a pinch of ashes from the vessel containing the ashes. Without using words, the minister then sprinkles these ashes on the heads of the recipients.

Through this ancient practice we witness to our intention to undertake penitential practices during these Lenten days. We join with the whole Church throughout the world in acknowledging our need for continuing conversion. We express our hope and firm conviction that through Christ's victory over sin and death our tears shall one day be turned to rejoicing.

The Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul is this MON, JAN 25. The 9th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles tells the story of Paul's conversion to Christ. This story is so important that Luke includes it 2 other times, and Paul tells it in his own words in the 1st

chapter of his Letter to the Galatians.

Before he became known as Paul his name was Saul. He was a tentmaker from Tarsus, who had studied to become a teacher. When Stephen, the 1st Christian martyr, was killed, Saul held the coats of those who threw the stones. Afterwards Saul set out for Damascus. He wanted to arrest any Christians who had escaped from Jerusalem after Stephen's death. Along the way, he was struck down to


the ground and blinded. He heard the voice of Jesus asking him, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?"

Saul was in shock. He allowed himself to be led to the home of Christians in Damascus. A holy man named Ananias prayed with him and his sight was restored. Saul went to an isolated spot to reflect on his new faith. Then he returned to Damascus and began preaching the Gospel.

Everyone was astounded at the change in him. Now Saul was the one being persecuted. His friends feared for his life. They helped him escape from Damascus by lowering him over the city wall in a basket.

Saul, who began to call himself by the Roman name Paul, went out on missionary journeys. He crossed the Roman Empire 4 times to bring the Good News of Christ to the world.

Thomas Aquinas' classmates called him "the dumb Sicilian ox" because he was big, slow-moving and shy. They didn't realize until later that Thomas was fantastically intelligent.

Thomas' family was related to emperors. He was born in the family castle at Rocca Secca in Italy. His parents prepared him for a life of importance. Instead, humble Thomas joined the Dominicans, an order whose friars took a vow of poverty.

His family was angry that he would

be begging for his living. His 6 older brothers, who were soldiers like their father, held him captive for more than a year while his mother and sisters tried to talk him into changing his mind. During that time, Thomas calmly read and studied, and also learned a great deal of the Bible by heart. Finally his family gave in and allowed him to return to the Dominicans.

Thomas kept quiet in his university classes because he did not like to show off his intellect. However, he was so brilliant that he became a professor at the University of Paris. He was also known as a great preacher.

In those years, just about everyone talked about religion. They got into big arguments over small matters. Some people insisted that the truth

of spiritual things is different from the truth of material things, and that only spiritual truths really mattered. But Thomas said to look in a mirror. Ask yourself, where does the body stop and the soul begin? How is it possible to separate spirit and matter?

In future years the ideas of Thomas Aquinas became the way that theology was taught in much of the church.

Thomas' writings fill 20 volumes. Perhaps he was able to produce so much in the midst of a busy life because of his deep prayer life. Celebrating the Eucharist often moved him to tears.

Thomas died at age 50. Because of his writings, Thomas has been honored with the title "Angelic Doctor" (which here means "teacher").

I Corinthians 7:29-31 WAITING FOR THE END

St. Paul was wrong about one thing. He thought the world was coming to an end quickly. It's nearly 2,000 years later, and we're still waiting.

But he was right about this: A good Christian lives as if the end were coming soon. We should live every day as if it were our last, ready to greet Christ when he comes again. After all, we don't really know when that might be.

Paul's advice sounds a little odd: If you're married, act like you're not. If you're crying, don't. If you're rejoicing, stop. On the surface it doesn't

make much sense. But Paul's point is that we should have other concerns. "The world in its present form is passing away." So don't put all your time, effort, and emotions into it. Think about the things of the next world. Do the things that will please God.

In truth, most of us act as though we'll live forever. We buy and hoard. We roam from one emotional relationship to another. Paul would have us settle our hearts on other things. Make the world more livable for someone else.

As we wait for the end, we take the world in stride. So what if the weather is bad, the car won't start, or the kid next door dyed his hair green? The world in its present form is passing away.

"We Believe in the Communion of Saints." The Communion of Saints is a doctrine that was included in the Apostles Creed and was readily used sometime around the year 100. It is based on St. Paul's 1st letter to the Corinthians. In chapter 12, St. Paul compares Christians to a single body where each member contributes to the good of all, and shares in the welfare of all. When St. Paul used the word "saints" in his writing, he was speaking of believers in Christ, both living and dead. Remember, that through our baptism, we pass "from death to life; death no longer has dominion over us". When our earthly body dies, we pass into eternal life. In Catholic terminology, the Communion of Saints is said to comprise the Church Militant (those undergoing purification in Purgatory), and the Church Triumphant (those already in heaven). What is most beautiful about this doctrine is the belief that those who are in heaven are in the presence of God. They constantly intercede with the Father for us. We think nothing about asking our close friends and relatives to pray for us. The saints in heaven are our friends and relatives as well. They are part of the Body of Christ whose prayers help us here on earth. St. Dominic said, "Do not weep, for I shall be more useful to you after my death and I shall help you then more effectively than during my life. "The Church also encourages us to imitate the holiness of the saints because they imitate the holiness of Christ. First among saints is our Blessed Mother. She is the quintessential model for us all, and never ceases to intercede on our behalf with her Son.
