



**STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE.** Due to an early print deadline, offertory amounts from NOV 10-11 collections will be reported next week.

Stewardship in the Scriptures always relates to the management of something that does not belong to us. Even our talents and special abilities belong to God. We own nothing that was not first given to us. God has entrusted us with aptitudes and abilities, and as good stewards, we must use them for His glory.

This is true not only of musical, artistic, athletic, academic, business, and persuasive talents, but also of spiritual gifts. Faithful stewardship of natural talents and spiritual gifts requires that we use them to glorify God and edify others. Our purpose is not to please ourselves, but to serve others.

Another aspect of good stewardship is that we learn to concentrate on the things we can do well and not worry about the things we cannot do.

Our calling is to be trustworthy with what we have been given, and not to envy or covet another person's abilities or ministry. Our abilities come from God, and He has equipped us to fulfill the purpose for which He has called us. Each of us has an arena of influence, whether large or small, and a specific ministry that the Lord has placed in our care. Regardless of what we have been given, every steward is tested by the same standard: faithfulness.

It is not the size of our ministry that counts, but what we do with what we have been entrusted.



#### Daniel 7:13-14 THE SOURCE OF SECURITY

Every day we seek security. We fasten the safety belts in our cars. We set alarms to prevent theft. We help watch our neighbors' homes. We take care of our health. We take what measures we can to help us feel secure.

There are few guarantees. Tragedy can befall even those who take precautions. The things of this world can provide supports for safety. But none of them can make us totally secure.

Security ultimately comes from God alone. The power of God is stronger than any theft, accident, or injury. It rules over illness and death. The power that created us will recreate us in love.

Jesus, our savior, had a favorite image for himself. He called himself the Son of Man. He took that expression from the Book of Daniel, where the prophet envisioned one like a Son of Man coming on the clouds of heaven. He receives dominion, glory, and kingship. All nations served him. His dominion extended over all lands and times.

In borrowing that image, Jesus gave his disciples a message of hope. He himself would lose security, suffering torment and death. But he himself would reign over all.

The church year ends with a vision of hope for each of us who seeks security: the coming of the Son of Man.

#### 5 SIMPLE STEPS TO PREPARE YOURSELF FOR ADVENT



◆ PREPARE ROOM AT THE INN. Your heart is where Christ wishes to dwell and Advent is the perfect time to make room in it for His presence. If your heart is filled with unforgiveness, it has no room for Christ. Begin Advent by an Examination of Conscience where you ask your Heavenly Father to re-

veal to you any unforgiveness that exists in your heart. Remember that as God has forgiven you, you are also asked to forgive others.

- ◆ CLEAN OUT THE COBWEBS. Next it is important to clean out the vestiges of cobwebs that may be lurking in the dark corners of your heart. This means that you should make a point of getting to Confession during Advent. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is an important part of preparing your heart for Jesus; this is because the priest acts in the person of Christ in helping you identify the cobwebs that you may not be seeing on your own typically those ones that have been hanging on for so long they no longer get your attention.
- ◆ HANG NEW CURTAINS. The room of your heart is ready: unforgiveness and cobwebs have been cleared out. Now it is time to hang new curtains! Many of us fall into a rut in our daily lives and forget how to

live in joy. You are preparing for Christ's indwelling and He abides best in those who have delight in their hearts. So throw out the old curtains of fear and despair and exhaustion and hang new curtains of hope and joy and anticipation.

- ◆GET OUT THE FINE CHINA AND SET THE TABLE. Company is on its way! We aren't doubtfully thinking that maybe He's going to drop by and thus we're making only superficial efforts to get ready. We are certain in our belief of His arrival and every cell in our body joyfully shouts, "He's on His way!" This is the time we get the fine china out of the cupboard our attitude is one of enthusiastic expectation. Our hearts pound in anticipation of His presence. Our fine china goes well with our new curtains!
- ◆ OPEN THE FRONT DOOR. All the work is finished and we are ready. So in preparing our hearts for Christ this Advent, the last step after all the prep work is to simply "be." In this state of "being" we don't question how time slipped through our fingers; we don't worry if there was more we should have done. We've been good and faithful servants and are ready for Christ.

## THE WOMAN AT THE WELL: THIRSTING FOR TRUTH



Have you ever experienced a season in your life when you truly felt that you "had it all?" Everything is going right. You are healthy. You are accomplishing goals and climbing to the top. You are thriving and finding purpose in your profession. Financially, you are comfortable. Your home life is fulfilling and your relationships/friendships are bringing you joy. In these moments, chances are you aren't really thinking about your reliance on God. You most likely aren't contemplating the many graces that God is giving you. Sure, you may thank God for your many blessings, but it comes as a fleeting thought as you go about your day. You don't spend a lot of time thinking, "Wow, God is really truly blessing me right now in this moment!" Rather than fully relying on God, you believe the lie that you are in complete control of your life.

Then something happens. You get sick. Work becomes stressful and unfulfilling. An unexpected expense drains your savings. You have a fight with your spouse. Your friends are too busy to be there for you.

The situations that you are experiencing are completely out of your control. In these moments, the temptation is to immediately blame God. Why is God punishing me? Why did God allow this terrible thing to happen? Why doesn't God care about me?

If we have not learned God's faithfulness in the normal affairs of life, we are not likely to suddenly learn the calm assurance of faith when assailed by life's greatest tests and trials. Rather than blaming God and asking, "Why is this happening to me?" we should take difficulties as an opportunity to ask, "What is this teaching me?" While God does not create evil or desire for us to be miserable, He very often uses our troubles to teach us to fully rely on HIM. He calls us to repent of our sinful habits, selfreliance, and prideful desires until we can truly say, "All that I am and all that I have is God's. He is in me and I am in Him, and that's all that matters."

# WHY IS THIS HAPPENING TO ME? WHAT IS THIS TEACHING ME?

What is God stripping away from your life? What do you trust in more than the Lord? God will break your dependence upon anything other than Himself no matter how long it takes or how difficult the process may be. If He has to, God will make you learn this lesson of reliance the hard way, which seems to be the ONLY way most of us learn to depend on God.

Whether you like it or not, He is committed to bringing you to a place of wholeness and spiritual maturity - conforming you to the likeness of His Son - so that He can work through you and bring others to wholeness and spiritual maturity through your testimony.

GOD WILL PULL YOU THROUGH TRIALS, NOT AROUND THEM. WE NEED THOSE TRIALS TO CLEANSE US OF IMPURITIES.

Maybe you are facing a time of brokenness and it feels as though the emotional pain is more than you can bear. Or perhaps you are dealing with a series of disappointments that have completely undermined your sense of security. Instead of becoming fearful, ask the Lord to reveal what He is teaching you.

Whenever you experience brokenness, God's grace can sustain and mature you. He will show you how to relinquish your reliance on earthly forms of security and teach you how to rest in His wonderful provision and love. In that way, you grow in the likeness of Christ and are prepared for future service. If you trust in God and learn from Him through your trial, He will reveal Himself to you and work through you in wonderful ways.
