We Americans have been a fortunate people. From our beginnings, we have never been oppressed by dictatorship; we are a democracy. While we have experienced the horror

of war, we have never been invaded. While we have not always achieved the goal of liberty and justice for all, we have not given up striving toward it. We are, indeed, most fortunate.

We pray in our good fortune for all God's family, whoever they are and however they think. We pray that our generation might provide for this family a greater sense of liberty and justice, equality and love. We cannot rest in our good fortune without increasing the heritage of freedom for the children of the world, all God's people and ours. May our prayers reflect these dreams of liberty, and thank God for His gift to each of us.


FRI, JUN 29 is The Feast of the Apostles, Saints Peter and Paul.

In the 4th century on this day, Roman Christians would follow the bishop in procession as he celebrated the Liturgy first at the Church of St. Peter (which was built over the saint's burial place) and then at the Church of St. Paul, outside the Walls.

Rome isn't the only city that celebrates this great day. Today's celebration is kept by all the liturgical churches all over the world. Eastern churches even have a period of fasting to prepare for this feast.

Peter and Paul came from thoroughly different backgrounds and had different gifts, but they had one great bond: both were called forth by Jesus' love.

Jesus gave Peter his name - which means "rock" - at their



first meeting. Jesus had chosen him to be the rock on which the new Church would be built. According to the Gospels, Peter often showed an understanding of Christ, but when Jesus was arrested and crucified, Peter denied Christ 3 times and hid in fear. When Jesus was risen from the dead, he told Peter, "Feed my lambs".

Peter was recognized by the other disciples as their leader. He called the apostles to select a replacement for Judas. On Pentecost morning, he preached a bold sermon. He performed the first miracle of healing in the name of Jesus. In a dream, he came to understand that the Gospel message was for everyone on earth, not only the Jews like himself. Finally, he made his way to Rome, the center of the empire.

Peter was probably imprisoned 3 or 4 times before being martyred around the year 64 during the persecutions of the emperor Nero. According to legend, he asked to be

crucified upside down, since he did not feel worthy to die the same way Jesus had died.

Early in his life, Paul determinedly persecuted Christians. But then he had a vision of Jesus, which left him with a complete change of heart. When Paul began preaching Christ, the Christians naturally were afraid of him. But over the next 30 years, Paul was able to convince them of his sincerity.



Paul was well-equipped to be a missionary. He had a bright mind and a good education. He was familiar with the Scriptures because he had studied to be a Rabbi.

Paul made 4 missionary journeys, crisscrossing the Mediterranean Sea. It's difficult to imagine what a challenge that must have been. Traveling by ship back then was something like traveling by space shuttle is today - it was expensive, dangerous and highly unusual. Paul was even shipwrecked. The exciting story is told in chapter 27 of the Acts of the Apostles.

Wherever Paul went, he left behind small Christian communities. He preached to all classes of people. Alot of what we know about Paul is from his letters to the various people and communities he cared about. Christian writings were written even before the Gospels.

Like Peter, Paul was martyred by Nero, perhaps around the year 67. Unlike Peter, Paul was a Roman citizen. This gave him the right to a trial, and when he was convicted, to a quick execution.

There is a legend that the city of Rome was founded by the brothers Romulus and Remus, who were raised by wolves. Peter and Paul came to be called the new founders of Rome. Their solemnity is a grand holiday in the city, a day on which Rome celebrates itself and all its treasures.

SUN, JUN 28, 2020 13TH SUN IN ORDINARY TIME Romans 6:3-4, 8-11 THE WALKING DEAD

They speak of someone on death row as a dead

man walking. The person sentenced to die is as good as dead. He or she may be walking around, but the person's life has virtually ended.

All Christians can be called dead people walking, though in a different way. In Baptism, we die to sin, but we continue to walk in the new life of Christ. Christians may be dead, but our life has virtually begun.

Some Christians are baptized as infants. Some are baptized as adults. When adults are baptized, they are asked to renounce their former way of life, to turn away from anything that keeps them from allegiance to Christ. When infants are baptized, parents and godparents renew their commitment

to Christ, and they pledge to share it with the child. Baptism makes all the difference in the world. It totally redirects our lives toward Christ, whether we are changing course as adults or committing ourselves to Christ from the start as infants.

St. Paul says to the Romans, "You too must think of yourselves as dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus." Christians are dead, yet walking.

Throughout our lives we recommit ourselves to our baptismal promises. We do it weekly at church when we recite the Creed. We do it any time we attend a baptism. We also do it each year at the Easter Vigil. We turn away from sin and turn toward Christ, who shows us how to walk in the newness of life.
