2 Thessalonians 2:16-3:5 ROCK SOLID PAUL

St. Paul seems invincible. He authored a series of letters of towering importance for Christianity. He devoted his entire life to the gospel. He traveled amid great hardship, endured shipwreck and imprisonment, and debated the truth with friend and foe alike. Throughout it all, it seemed as though nothing could stop him.

We all know people like that. They are great leaders, committed to a cause, who persevere in the midst of natural and human obstacles to obtain the prize they seek. Solid as a rock, they invite admiration.

St. Paul was like that. But once in a while, we see a different Paul, a more human Paul, one who needed help to stay the course. The Second Letter to the Thessalonians comes from Paul and some of his companions. They had success in Thessalonica, and they hoped it would repeat elsewhere. But there were obstacles. "Brothers and sisters, pray for us, so that the word of the Lord may speed forward and be glorified, as it did among you, and that we may be delivered from perverse and wicked people, for not all have faith."

"Not all have faith." In those few words hide a world of sorrow, disappointment, and pain. Not all have faith. Not everyone believes as we do, and it is sometimes hard to persevere. Paul seemed invincible, but only because he relied on the help of others, who prayed for him in his distress.

Prior to his current appointment, Pardini was organist and director of music at Shadyside Presbyterian Church, Pittsburgh, where he headed one of the nation's leading sacred music programs. Before his arrival in Pittsburgh, Pardini was the senior organist at the Crystal Cathedral (now Christ Cathedral) in Garden Grove, CA.

A New Jersey native, Pardini is also active as a composer of liturgical music. His music is published by G.I.A. (Chicago), Fred Bock Music (Los Angeles) and Morningstar Music (St. Louis). His "New Century Mass" was awarded 2nd place in the NPM New Mass Competition by National Pastoral Musicians at their convention in 2010. He also won 3rd place in the 2nd International Competition of Sacred Music Composition, established in honor of Pope Benedict XVI, in Rome, Italy.

Pardini lives in Greensburg with his wife, daughter and son. He is a Novice Oblate of Saint Benedict, associated with Saint Vincent Archabbey in Latrobe. Our 4 Parishes will once again be teaming up with Saint Vincent de Paul for their Thanksgiving Basket Project!



THE WOMAN AT THE WELL:
THIRSTING FOR TRUTH

endurance - noun

- I. the ability to withstand hardship or adversity especially: the ability to sustain a prolonged stressful effort or activity
- 2. the act or an instance of enduring or suffering

In his letter to the Thessalonians, Saint Paul urges the faithful to direct their hearts "to the love of God and to the endurance of Christ." The ENDURANCE of Christ. At first. that seems extremely daunting. How can we be expected to endure sufferings, persecutions, and wrongdoings to the extent that our Lord did? And yet, we look at stories like that of our first reading today from Micah and see examples of those who have "regarded" their "sufferings as nothing" for the sake of Christ! We read about incredible acts of endurance depicted in the lives of the martyrs/Saints. We hear news stories of individuals who have completely defied the odds stacked against them. We experience pain, loss, and hardships; often looking back to those moments that took away a piece of ourselves and wondering, how on EARTH we got through!

Without a doubt, fortitude is one of the most incredible gifts that the Holy Spirit gives us in order to endure!

Fortitude (or courage) enables a person to overcome difficulties and endure pain and suffering. Fortitude is the gift of the Holy Spirit that gives us the ability to CHARGE our pain with positive energy; enabling the person to suffer in joy. In this culture of fear, pain, and suffering in which we live in, we NEED endurance to recover and thrive! Endurance helps us to push through suffering and get back to life. Endurance helps us to keep going when we are fatigued, weak, exhausted, or facing discouragement! Partnered with fortitude, endurance helps us to undertake GREAT deeds while withstanding GREAT hardship.

HOW DO WE CULTIVATE FORTITUDE?

COMMUNITY. Keep in mind that fortitude thrives within a sacred community. When bad things happen, it's common for people to withdraw from others. Sharing our experiences with others can be difficult. And yet, if we want to grow fortitude, we must instead seek out community. Our faith communities provide us with a way to think about, understand, and value suffering; helping us to find meaning IN suffering. Whether we like it or not, we all NEED community.

SPIRITUAL SURRENDER. In line with the writings of Thomas Aquinas, those who embody fortitude often em-

brace the idea that it is by God's grace alone that we carry on despite our struggles. Wisdom comes from suffering when we learn what we

Complete surrender is fully accepting whatever God has planned no matter the pain or cost.

DO and DO NOT have control over.

FINDING PURPOSE IN ONE'S SUFFERING.
We need to learn from our pain

in order to redeem our pain. We may never GET the closure we are looking for, but we can create closure for ourselves. We may never know WHY something tragic happened, but we can allow God to use our pain to heal and bless other people.

LAMENTING. Sometimes we need to embrace the pain and allow ourselves to grieve! When we do not cope with a loss or hardship, we become bitter and completely overwhelmed. Grieving not only gets us in touch with our own personal loss, it also allows us to look outside ourselves in order to recognize the sufferings and pain of others.


PRACTICING GRATITUDE AMIDST STRUGGLE.

Gratitude reminds us that no matter how difficult life is or what we are going through; there is always something for which we can give thanks. It prompts us to re-

member that God is with us in times of deep sorrow.

SEEKING REFUGE IN OUR BELIEFS. Several studies have found that faith can help provide a significant buffer against common negative psychological consequences following disasters and trauma. At times, God is the ONLY thing that can get us through another day, hour, or moment! Life is difficult enough WITH God, let alone WITHOUT Him. Personal transformation happens when we cling to the cross and allow ourselves to grow closer to Jesus through our sufferings.

Before returning to Rome last summer. I wrote a mini reflection on what life had been like as a priest to that point. I thought I would do the

same reflecting on my time as administrator now that I shall be returning to the "lowly" position of parochial vicar once again.

- ♦ I've learned a great deal during my time as administrator pro tem. Like what pro tem means. And why most priests have signatures that only take 0.5 seconds to write.
- Probably the biggest lesson I learned is to keep my eyes open and to ask questions about what I see. I tend not to be a very observant person, so I can miss a lot of helpful tidbits if I'm not paying attention.
- ◆ Despite seven years of seminary formation and study, there is a lot about the Church that I don't know. And that is OK.
- ◆ As long as I'm in Connellsville, I doubt I'll ever need to learn how to cook. Learning how to exercise is far more pressing.
- ♦ Prior to this summer I rarely prayed to the Holy Spirit. That has changed immensely. On the days when I've had to preach multiple homilies, I've never been adequately prepared and have asked the Holy Spirit to guide my thoughts and my words. Sure enough, when I have, I've received a response – often as I am standing at the ambo proclaiming the Gospel. If this surprises you, know that it surprises and delights me even more.

- ◆ Upon realizing this power of the Holy Spirit, the biggest temptation I've had is to presumptuousness. Relying on the Holy Spirit when I've had time to prepare and didn't is called laziness, not trust.
- ♦ I don't miss Italy at all. Being able to be with my family each weekend makes up for the lack of fresh pasta and gelato.
- ♦ Prayer seems to be the most obvious thing to cut when we get busy but is the most important thing for long-term health. Without a life of prayer, I will burn out. I haven't been at this for very long, but just a few months have shown me this...not to mention hearing it from a number of other priests!
- ♦ I'm so grateful to be a part of the Catholic Church. Our Church hierarchy and structure may feel top-heavy at times, but the professional resources in Greensburg that were made available to me during my days as administrator more than make up for it. I would have been lost without their guidance. They help us much more than we realize.
- ♦ It pays to keep an alb and the ritual books (baptism, marriage, funeral, anointing) in your car when you have four parishes. Are back -seat bookends a thing?
- ♦ More often than I'd like to admit, I have been presented with seemingly unsolvable situations and asked for guidance. It's sometimes easy to forget that they are not asking me for advice as a thir- ◆ I love being a priest. ty-five year old man but as a priest and a representative of Christ. At times people have said they found wisdom and comfort in my words - if that is true, it

- must be from God since it's certainly not my extensive experience.
- I'm a terrible gardener.
- ♦ I'm very excited to be the chaplain at Geibel. I've greatly enjoyed teaching and being with the students and faculty. It seems to be a perfect "next step" for me.
- ◆ The most important person is the person in front of me. Even when a confession goes long or a parishioner is distraught and causes me to be late for something, that person is worthy of my full attention. I suspect it will take a lifetime to learn how to do this well.
- ♦ This also means that at times the most effective ministry is the least efficient. Although my homilies and articles reach many people at once, my one-on-one conversations with people have seemed to have a greater impact and bear greater fruit.
- ♦ I have gotten used to being in charge - to running with an idea without needing permission. It will take some time to unlearn this and will probably frustrate me some days. But once I get used to the new normal, I know that I'll be happier - and certainly less stressed out.
- ◆ There is nothing quite like being called upon to energize us and help us become. I have seen this not only in myself but in our staff and our volunteers. Amid the confusion and uncertainty, your steadfastness and resolve have been commendable. Thank you.
