Sirach 27:4-7
THE BENT OF ONE'S MIND

We do it all the time - we size up people by the way they look. We judge their character by their face - the light of their eyes, the turn of their mouth. We make presumptions about people's abilities by seeing their height and weight. We categorize them by race and ethnicity. We predetermine the wisdom they have by guessing their age. We make a lot of ridiculous judgments before we even meet people.

And other people do the same to you. They make unfair assumptions before you open your mouth. It is not right.

But once you say something - well, then people learn a lot more. "The fruit of a tree shows the care it has had; so too does one's speech disclose the bent of one's mind."

Ouch. That piece of wisdom from the Book of Sirach reminds us that what we say reveals a lot about who we are. Sometimes we think more of ourselves than our speech discloses. When we say something we do not mean, it reveals something about ourselves to others. It is not always good. "When a sieve is shaken, the husks appear; so do one's faults when one speaks."

It is not right to form prejudices against other people, but it is healthy to realize that each one of us has strengths and weaknesses. Our own character will be revealed the more we speak.

We can all shape ourselves into better people if we think before we speak.

THE WOMAN AT THE WELL: THIRSTING FOR TRUTH

THE PEACE PROMISE

Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye, when you do not even notice the wooden beam in your own eye?" You hypocrite! Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye.

Two years ago, Lent was about to begin and admittedly, I had not put very much thought into the upcoming season. My sister had passed away a few months earlier, and I was in the midst of a very deep, very dark depression. At the same time, I was experiencing deep conflict in several relationships in my life, both personally and professionally. I desperately wanted and needed certain things from certain people, and no one seemed to measure up. I could not understand at the time WHY these individuals who claimed they cared for me were hurting me on a deeply personal level in my weakest and most vulnerable state! So, in desperation, I purchased a book I had found online called, "The Peace Promise" by Catholic author John Kuypers.

In this powerful book, Mr. Kuypers coins the term "The Peace Promise" to the very teaching we hear today

in the Gospel: "First remove the wooden beam from your eye; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye." For Kuypers, a wooden beam is a judgment. A splinter is a fault. When we see a fault that bothers us, we judge it because we do not like it. We have a prejudicial view about what we think SHOULD be happening. These biases about others' behaviors rob us of our peace.

Kuypers explains that through the practice of the Peace Promise, Jesus gives us a path to the promise of his healing and nourishing peace on ANY given issue! In other words, Jesus offers us a teaching about how we can actually cause a change in the person or situation stealing our peace IF we are FIRST willing to change something in ourselves. In plain English, it means that we must first get neutral about outcomes. When we get neutral, we will see clearly what to do.

When I first read this, it seemed impossible! How could I get neutral about things/people that were hurting me the most? Wouldn't that make me a doormat? And I certainly didn't want to hammer out my demands in order to get what I wanted either! The more I discovered about the Peace Promise, however, the more I realized that getting neutral meant doing what Jesus taught; to forgive and to seek forgiveness. One reason getting neutral works is that we set others free to make their own choices. Rather than pressuring them to please us or causing them to react defensively against what we want them to do, our unbiased stance causes them to take ownership of their choices and the resulting risks and consequences. When we are neutral about outcomes, we stop taking things personally. We stop blaming others. We become reconciled with our own faults and inadequacies.

To truly get neutral, we must first set aside our ego and become extremely aware of who we truly are (and that God loves us anyway). By doing this, we see our own faults and begin to love others mercifully as God loves us. We begin to remove the biases of how we believe others should behave. We begin to accept the fact that people have the right to make mistakes, even when those mistakes hurt us.

Getting neutral does not mean accepting bad behavior or doing nothing. Getting neutral simply means to temporarily get centered so that we have time to spiritually discern what we need to do to respond wisely to the challenge facing us. We see clearly what we need to do and we are ready to take confident action. By getting neutral, we open our mind, heart and soul to how God wants us to respond. We are surrendered. We are at peace with uncertainty and the possibility of things not working out. We are more present for others. We respond gracefully in brave new ways.

I got neutral about my personal situation. I realized that in my grief, I was imposing impossible standards on my loved ones while at the same time, not communicating what I needed most. Rather, I believed that they "should know" what I needed. How incredibly unfair to them! I got neutral and accepted that the ONLY perfect person that could give me true peace and complete wholeness was Jesus Christ, and that I needed to lean on HIM ALONE while freely accepting and being grateful for any help offered by my family and friends.

This Lent, I encourage you to practice the Peace Promise! You do not need to purchase the book to live this most important teaching of Jesus!

RCIA during Lent. The period of Lent is known in the RCIA as Purification and Enlightenment.
