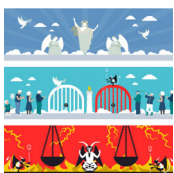

This year has helped us realize a deeper need for each other and the Lord, so let's take some time to express our thanks through actions and prayers!

Fr. Michael McGivney, founder of the Knights of Columbus, was beatified on **OCT 31, 2020**. Fr. McGivney was a beloved parish priest, remembered by many as "a man of the people". He was zealous of the people's welfare. In 1882, Fr. McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus at a local parish to provide financial and personal support to those in need. Today more than 1.8 million Knights contribute about \$160 million and 70 million hours of volunteer service to charitable causes each year.

Next SUN, NOV 15, at the 9:30am Mass, the Knights from our Local Council #948 will gather together to honor Fr. McGivney and pray for his intercession in the needs of our parishes and this council.





A young, Christian soldier lay in the hospital bed distraught and overwhelmed. His leg had been shattered by a cannonball and, although the surgeries

were successful enough that he would walk again, he would always limp. This meant that his promising military career had come to an end. The man loved soldiering. As a child he loved listening to the tales of the knights of Camelot and other great and noble warriors. As he lay in bed, he remembered those stories and pondered them often. Although they brought him joy for a time, they only led him to a sadness of what might have been.

Eventually the man grew bored during his bed rest and asked for some stories of knights and chivalry to be brought to him. But there were none to be found. Begrudgingly, he began to read what was brought to him – books about the life of Jesus and the lives of

the saints. In a short time, his boredom turned to interest, then intrigue, then to fascination. After a while he noticed something. Imagining himself as a famous warrior like those in the stories he grew up with brought him temporary enjoyment but led to an abiding sadness. But imagining himself as a famous saint like those he read about in his hospital bed brought him great joy that remained much longer. This man did become a great saint – St. Ignatius of Loyola. And it wouldn't have happened if he hadn't been forced to set aside his distracting stories of war and battle and embrace the life of Christ and the lives of the saints.

We live in a time much different from that of St. Ignatius. When we get bored, we never run out of stories. There are enough excellent movies, TV shows, and novels to fill multiple lifetimes. So, unlike St. Ignatius, if we want to ponder the life of Christ and the lives of the saints, we must do so intentionally. We must learn to set

aside distractions and focus on the things of God.

I invite you to a challenge. Watch two movies. First, watch one that the world acclaims – there are many excellent movies out there with incredible plots, characters, and special effects. Then watch a movie about the life of Jesus or about the lives of the saints. Then try to notice which one leaves you truly feeling better afterward.

St. Ignatius and I are betting on the second. Religious movies may not be able to compete with high-budget films in terms of special effects or plot-twists. But high budget films have nothing on the story-writing of God and the consolation and hope they bring.

FRI, NOV 13, IS THE FEAST OF ST. FRANCES XAVIER CABRINI

Frances was the youngest child in a large family in Italy. Her dream from early childhood was to spread the faith in China, as her patron saint Francis Xavier had done. After training to be a teacher, she applied to join a religious order, but was refused. After working with orphans for a few years, Frances decided to start the first order of missionary sisters. Soon an abandoned friary became the new home of the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart. Seven women who had joined Frances in service at the orphanage became the first members of the order. Their special work was teaching young girls. In a few years so many women had come to join the order that the friary became severely overcrowded. To her surprise, Frances began to receive encouragement to look west instead of east for her missionary work. Of the 50,000 Italians newly arrived in New York, many had never had any religious education and most didn't go to Mass. Their lives were spent in crowded tenement neighborhoods. Archbishop

Corrigan of New York City sent Frances a formal invitation to begin her missionary work there. When Frances and her sisters got to New York, the archbishop's plans for them had fallen through. He wanted them to return home on the next boat, but Frances was determined to stay. Soon she had earned a reputation as a shrewd bargainer in her handling of money. Always she trusted that God would provide, and she was right. By the time Frances died, she had begun 67 badly needed schools, orphanages and hospitals in the US, Central and South America, Italy, France and England. In all she crossed the ocean 30 times. After she died, her sisters fulfilled her dream of doing missionary work in China. Mother Cabrini, as Frances came to be called, became the first American citizen to be canonized. She is a patron saint of immigrants.

THIS WED, NOV 11, IS VETERANS' DAY.

In the early years of the 20th century, a war called the Great War involved most of the countries of the earth. Millions died as a result of new and terrible weapons. Everyone hoped that it was the "war to end all wars". A very special time was chosen as the hour when the guns would be stilled and peace declared: the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. By this choice, the signers of the peace treaty suggested that humankind had waited until it was nearly too late. The war would come to be known as the First World War.

The day chosen for the beginning of peace was special for another reason. It was the memorial of St. Martin of Tours. Martin had been a soldier in the army until he laid down his weapons. His feast day, Martinmas, was a celebration of peace. That day had also been a thanksgiving festival in Europe since the Middle Ages. Now there was even more reason to be thankful.

In Canada, Armistice Day became known as Remembrance Day after the Second World War. It became a time to honor those who died in both conflicts.



In the US this day is now called Veterans' Day. All Americans who have fought in wars during this century - those who survived as well as those who died - are honored.

How does your community make it possible for you to gain wisdom? Do people gather for formal education? Do guests come to speak? Does your community promote the reading of books and the discussion of ideas?

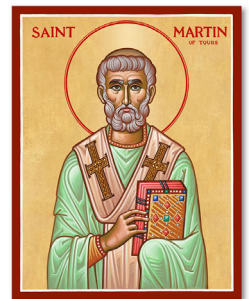
God's wisdom is not meant to be remote. It is ready for us before we are ready for it. When we go to seek wisdom, wisdom will be there waiting.

THIS WED, NOV 11, IS THE FEAST OF ST. MARTIN OF TOURS (BISHOP (C. 316-397))

"I am a soldier of Christ. It is not lawful for me to fight." With these words Martin of Tours identified himself forever as a saint of peace. How fitting that his feast day has become a celebration of peace and a day of thanksgiving for its blessings!

Martin's parents were pagans. They lived in Pannonia, in what would later become Hungary. After he became a catechumen at age 10, Martin's parents would not allow him to be baptized. His father was a soldier. At that time Roman law required that sons follow their fathers' line of work. So Martin had to join the army. He served in Gaul for 3 years.



According to legend, as a young officer he met a shivering beggar on a cold, snowy evening. On a kind impulse he cut his military cloak apart and gave half to the beggar. It was then that Martin decided to be baptized.

Later, when a barbarian invasion threatened, Martin made his famous statement of peace to the emperor. Centuries later, in the 1980s, Catholic bishops of the US wrote a teaching letter on peace. They mentioned Martin as an example of someone with the courage to refuse to do violence.

Martin laid down his weapons and spent the rest of his life as a soldier for Christ. Because of his generous life and the miracles of compassion he worked, people all over Gaul became Christians.

Martin was made bishop of the city of Tours. He visited every parish in the large diocese every year. When he was dying the people begged him not to leave them. Ever the soldier, Martin prayed, "Lord, if your people still need me, let me stay with them. But surely I have already fought long enough." Then he died peacefully. Martin was so loved that he became the first person who was not a martyr to be honored as a saint. Because Tours was located on a trade route, the fame of St. Martin was carried all over Europe. Pilgrims came in great numbers to visit his grave.

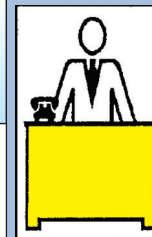
