Colossians 3:12-21 THE FORGIVING FAMILY

The Christian family is a symbol of forgiveness and love. Every family has its rough spots. Within one family not everyone believes the same and prays the same. Some show love comfortably, others with embarrassment. Some naturally look out for someone else; others are concerned about themselves. Some boast about their accomplishments, others are humble. Some have old hurts that still ache, others have healed and forgiven. Families are not perfect, but family, each family will bring forthey are designed for love.

On Holy Family Sunday, we remember that the model of family love is the love that Christ gives us. The Letter to the Colossians says, "As the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do."

All society is a symbol of forgiveness and love. At least it should be. God loved us all enough to send lesus into the world. He came to save us. We do not always respond to this love the way that we should. But at least we have a model for what love is like. It is compassionate, kind, humble, gentle, and patient. Within the world, we have our differences, but we hold this in common: the ability to live in peace and the grace of God's forgiveness.

At Christmas we celebrate the gift of God's forgiveness, Christ, our redeemer. We try to imitate that forgiveness as individuals, as families, and as a community. If the forgiving Christ dwells in each giveness to the world.

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS TO HELP YOU GROW IN FAITH THIS YEAR

There is nothing wrong with losing weight, paying off debt, or setting a new goal for 2019. But, if our faith is truly the number one priority in our lives, shouldn't it top our list of resolutions for the upcoming year?

Would you like to resolve to grow closer to the Lord and His Church in 2019? If so, here are 10 ideas to help get you started. I'd really encourage you not to simply pick one at random and say you're going to do it. Take some time to prayerfully consider what will best help you grow in faith!

GO TO CHURCH EVERY WEEK

Yes, I know you are busy. BUT we have SEVEN different opportunities every weekend to attend Mass here in Our Lady Queen of the Yough Catholic Community. YOU CAN make it to ONE! Countless people have told me that when they are attending Mass regularly, they can feel a real difference in their lives! Mass sets the tone for the rest of the week. Through the Eucharist, we are spiritually fed and filled up so that we can continue to pour ourselves out.

SET ASIDE AT LEAST 15 MINUTES A DAY TO PRAY Again, I fully recognize that time is an issue for most of us. But even if you are busy, you STILL have time for God. You just have to MAKE it. You could...

- ♦ Wake up 15 minutes earlier
- Pray in the shower
- Pray while you're doing your hair/make-up
- Pray during your morning or evening commute
- ◆ Pray on your lunch break
- Pray while making dinner, washing dishes, or folding laundry
- Pray with your kids before they go to sleep every night

KEEP HOLY THE SABBATH

Keeping the Sabbath holy goes far

beyond going to Mass on the weekend. The Sabbath, after all, is our day of rest. I know I am going to get eye rolls from parents with children when I say to rest on the Sabbath. As someone with 3 children, I get it. But I also acknowledge that I need to MAKE time to rest. Just a few weeks ago, I had to simply say NO to a ministry opportunity. As much as I absolutely HATE to say no (especially for a worthy cause), I knew I needed to take that day for God and my family. What can you cut out or cut back on this year to leave room for rest and Sabbath?

Read your Bible/ Participate in a Bible Study Your Bible is NOT meant to collect dust on your book shelf. If you don't know where to start, we use the Mission 119 series for our Adults and Children in Faith Formation. I would be happy to prepare the weekly children's packets for you if you are interested, and they are free! The Mission 119 App also makes it easy for you to read weekly adult scripture reflections from your phone. Tom Severin also has a weekly Adult Bible Study at Immaculate Conception on Wednesday evenings.

START TITHING

When we give, it is an act of faith that shows that we are committed to God and the work of the Kingdom. Open handed giving releases joy, prosperity, and favor in our lives. Giving is not just about making a donation; it is about making a difference. Our parishes will NOT be able to make an impact or do any type of ministry if we can't afford to keep the lights on!

BEGIN VOLUNTEERING

One of the best ways that we can be Christ's hands and feet in a broken world is through service to our parish and our community. Sadly, many of the same people volunteer for EVERYTHING and quickly get burnt out. Above and beyond volunteering for our parishes, our local community is always in need of people willing to

lend a hand in various projects. Rita Smith at Community Ministries, or our very own Mayor Greg Lincoln, would both be happy to direct you!

LISTEN TO CHRISTIAN MUSIC

Every New Year, K-LOVE has a challenge in which participants listen to NOTHING but Christian music for 30 days. Four years ago I participated in the challenge, and four years later I am STILL listening to nothing but Christian music! Truly it has made a world of difference in my life. Put on Christian radio in the car, at work, or even while you're cleaning the house and see how it changes your mood, your outlook and even the atmosphere of your home!

STOP COMPLAINING

Are you guilty of complaining? Philippians 2:14 reminds us to "Do everything without complaining and arguing." Trust me; I know how satisfying it can be to complain about slow drivers, work, bills, opinionated trolls on Facebook, and grocery cashiers who put raw meat in the same bag with raw vegetables (seriously people)! But in this case, it really is best to just bite your tongue.

REFUSE TO GOSSIP

I will admit it; it is so FUN to gossip, especially in a small town! HOWEVER, 99% of the time, the information that we are spreading is MISIN-FORMED CHATTER. Gossip creates an environment of negativity and passive aggressive behavior. Again, before you speak, think! FIND A MENTOR OR ACCOUNTABILITY PARTNER It's one thing to say you're going to make a change in your life; it's another to find someone to keep you accountable to actually make that change. If you're feeling stuck, or are serious about changing, find a mentor or partner to help hold you accountable.

WE ARE FAMILY! Today the Church celebrates the Feast of the Holy Family of Nazareth. As we meditate on that most perfect family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph it is the PERFECT opportunity to reflect on the state of our own families. And beyond each of our biological families I propose a reflection on the state of our faith family as well. In case it hasn't been noticed I quite frequently refer to our grouping of four parishes as a **FAMILY**. That is a VERY **DELIBERATE** choice on my part, brothers and sisters! (Did you get that subtle reference?!)

Of course, anyone with even a glancing familiarity with Sacred Writ understands that from beginning to end Scripture is suffused with familial language and imagery. As we transition from the Old Testament to the New that image becomes more inclusive; for the Jewish people membership in "the family" was restricted by and large to those who were, by blood, members of the Jewish race. Jesus expanded "the family" to include all who accepted him, regardless of the race of people to which they belonged.

That Old-to-New-Testament transition towards a greater inclusiveness is precisely the situation in which we find ourselves. Not that long ago (mere months for our "youngest" family member!) we were four separate families. And now through "marriage" (admittedly

ARRANGED marriages) we have become one. That certainly brings with it challenges. (Pop culture video aid: think of the challenges Carol and Mike faced in integrating Greg, Peter, and Bobby with Marsha, Jan, and Cindy!) In the past six and a half years, to the great credit of our parishioners, many challenges have been met and overcome. It has been my greatest joy watching this maturation in the family of which I am symbolically the head (there is logic behind my title "Father!). As I have made clear in this space already, I have been especially **DELIGHTED** at the preternatural swiftness with which Saint Aloysius has willing integrated into its new family! I would gladly propose them as a PERFECT model to be imitated by other parishes being partnered.

If you have been a regular reader of this weekly column (and its predecessor "Rambles and Rants") you undoubtedly also know that there are challenges that have NOT been met and overcome. Admittedly, I tend to harp on those unmet challenges, but I'm doing it for YOUR good. Think of me as an annoying parent; I only harp because I want the BEST for my children. I want you to be **ALL** YOU CAN BE!

On this last Sunday of Anno Domini Two Thousand Eighteen, on the cusp of a brand new year (and as I look forward to my seventh anniversary as your Pastor) my fervent desire is that EVERY parishioner will overcome any INORDINATE attachment to THEIR church (and VERY SADLY - for a very, very, very few - positive HATRED of the other churches) and embrace their role as members of the bigger family of Our Lady, Queen of the Yough Catholic Community. We will be so much more effective in our primary mission of proclaiming the GOOD NEWS of the Kingdom if we all come together. I am profoundly thankful for the many who are already onboard and trust that the Lord will touch the hearts of the few recalcitrants who seem to be holding out for a past that will NEVER return.

May the words of Sister Sledge's 1979 hit - and the Pirate's World Series anthem that year (yes, Virginia, there WAS a winning MLB team in town!) - be Our Lady, Queen of the Yough Catholic Community theme song in 2019:
