Jeremiah 33:14-16 HUNGRY FOR JUSTICE AND PEACE

The Scriptures of Advent open this year with an appeal for justice and security. Our society longs for a better life the same way ancient Israel and Judah did. We long for safety within our borders. We long for leaders of blameless conduct. We long for these blessings to last.

During Advent we want to see the fulfillment of God's promises. God promised peace. God promised safety. God promised good leaders. God promised food, drink, and strength. During Advent we anticipate the fulfillment of God's main promise: salvation. We await the celebration of the birth of Jesus, whose name means Savior and whose mission brought redemption.

But we still await something more. We need God's presence in our midst now. We need peace in our lives now. We need leaders in whom we can trust, leaders we can admire, leaders who cooperate with the plan of God. And we need them now.

Through Jeremiah, we hear God's promise for something unique and wonderful: "a just shoot." God promises a strong sprout of new growth nudging up from the earth. This shoot will flower with justice. The earth and rain will fertilize its seed and make it grow from year to year.

This Advent our society yearns for a just shoot, the fulfillment of God's promise.

THE WOMAN AT THE WELL: THIRSTING FOR TRUTH



LOVE AND HOLINESS May the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we have for you, so as to strengthen your hearts, to be blameless in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his holy ones.

HOLINESS. When a word is so uniquely religious it sometimes doesn't seem to be as practical as some other words. Our Second Reading for today from the letter of Saint Paul to the Thessalonians defines HOLINESS and sheds light on the heart of what true holiness means.

I don't know about you, but as a child when I would hear the word "holiness," it was very mysterious to me; a strange word. This was especially true when someone would point to a particular person and say, "Do you see that man? He is a holy man." I didn't quite know what to make of that, whether that meant that he was part of a secret club, or that he never smiled, or that he was living on some higher level of existence. Holiness seemed to be something

distant, something totally removed from ordinary life.

I think many Christians have this sort of view of holiness. Sometimes God's people see holiness as some abstract thing, or as something lofty and unattainable; something that is so religious and so spiritual that it's hard to know how it connects with real life. But Paul doesn't see it that way. On the contrary, Paul is teaching us that...

If you want to be perfected in holiness, you need to grow in love.

One day we are going to be perfected in holiness, rid of sin, and fully alive to God's will. The people of God will be perfectly sanctified, so that Christ might present the Church to Himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle, that she might be holy and blameless.

Paul doesn't view holiness as something so religious or abstract that it doesn't connect with real life. Yes, it is something lofty, and something religious and spiritual – but it also very much connects with everyday life. It must connect with everyday life.

If holiness is not lived out in a concrete way that can be described as love, it is not really holiness.

If holiness is a matter of being increasingly conformed to God's law, and if as Paul says in Romans 13, "love is the fulfillment of the law", then it makes sense that as we grow in love, we come more in line ness means pursuing the heart of with God's law, and thus become more holy.

This dynamic also makes sense to

us as we face our sin. For example, if you grow in love for your neighbor, you are less likely to covet your neighbor's possessions. The more you grow in depth of love for your spouse, the less attractive the prospect of adultery becomes. The more you love your fellow man, the harder it is to harbor any malice towards them. If we perfectly loved everyone, there would be no sin!

Love is the soil in which holiness grows toward perfection. Love is the means by which a person's heart gets established as blameless in holiness.

This truth ought to shape our prayer life! We have a tremendous privilege to pray for one another in the body of Christ, and this should be a theme that is frequently on our lips - that the Lord would make us to increase and abound in love for one another, and for all men and women!

Notice that it is the Lord who must accomplish this - as easy as the concept of love might be, it can be the most difficult thing in the world to actually implement! An increasing, abounding love for one another and for all people is not something that comes naturally or easily to us. It takes divine power, so we must pray to the One who has that power.

Growing in love is how God grows us in our holiness; the call to holi-God for the love of the world.

CHRISTMAS SCHEDULE: With the beginning of Advent it is time to announce the Mass schedule for Christmas. Of course a new wrench was thrown in this FUN-FILLED yearly "holiday tradition" with the addition of Saint Aloysius to our family. Fortunately, it wasn't a GREAT BIG, CHAOS-CAUSING WRENCH O'DEATH! I was able to more or less replicate the 2015 schedule and simply add in two Masses in Dunbar. As we move into the future the Christmas schedule will change to a four year rotation instead of a three year one. (At least until we have 5, or 6, or 7 parishes in our community!)

As you will notice it is Saint Rita's year to have only one Mass and that Mass will be the Midnight Mass. I anticipate that there will be those who will grumble "Well, with THREE priests now, why can't we have MORE MASSES." Let me try to offer an explanation; although I know it won't satisfy everyone, I trust that reasonable people will be persuaded that I AM being logical.

The reality is that the vast majority of people these days attend the first Mass on Christmas Eve, and the earlier the **BETTER**. To be honest I am not thrilled with this fact. I grew up going to Mass on Christmas DAY with my family and then going to - and usually serving - Midnight Mass once I started working at Burn's Drug and had to

work in the morning; the evening Mass was specifically for families with small children. I actually remember my Dad dropping grandma off for the Christmas Eve Mass and lecturing her as to why she SHOULDN'T be going to that Mass! But regardless of my own PERSONAL feelings it is what it is and I have to deal with it. So acknowledging the reality, THREE early Masses have been scheduled; two at 4:30 (Immaculate Conception and Saint Aloysius) and one at 5:00 (Saint John). I trust that every last one of us will take as given that THREE priests cannot celebrate FOUR Masses at basically the same time! Furthermore the halfhour difference between the two Connellsville Masses will allow people who can't pack into IC to go down the hill in time for the Saint John Mass.

With well over half of people choosing to pack into the early Christmas Eve Masses (three this year), that leaves a considerably smaller number of people to spread out across the other four Masses. As a priest let me tell you, practically NOTHING is more depressing than celebrating Christmas in a nearly empty church. And that's exactly what will happen if we schedule too many. Because of that I even hesitated scheduling two Masses on Christmas morning; next year, if it is clear that one Mass suffices the schedule will be

adjusted accordingly.

Another important fact that mitigates against expanding the number of Masses is the difficulty in filling in all the ministries needed to celebrate the solemn feast of Christmas in a fitting and dignified manner. We will already be stretching our music ministry beyond the breaking point with seven Masses. Any more would have to be a cappella, perhaps without even a cantor. As for altar servers, lectors, EMHCs, and ushers we end up having to make endless phone calls BEGGING people to serve at the less-popular Masses.

With all those WORDS as background, without further ado, here is the 2018 Christmas Mass schedule:

4:30pm Immaculate Conception

4:30pm Saint Aloysius 5:00pm Saint John

7:30pm Immaculate Conception

Midnight Saint Rita
9:00am Saint John
9:30am Saint Aloysius
