Hebrews 10:5-10 Why Jesus Was Born

The Letter to the Hebrews explains why Jesus was born. It quotes two phrases from the Book of Psalms. In the first, the psalmist says that God is displeased with sacrifices. Some people had been offering sacrifices without much meaning. They went through the ritual, but they put no heart into the words and actions. The psalmist sings, "Sacrifice and offering you did not desire." Whatever they were doing to please God wasn't working.

In the second phrase, the psalmist has a new idea - a different offering that might please God. What is this new offering? The psalmist is. "Behold, I come to do your will." If God was not pleased with the smoke of dead animals, perhaps God would be pleased with the obedience of a living psalmist.

Hebrews recalls these two phrases as they reflect on the birth of Jesus. Jesus came because whatever we were doing to please God was not working. He came and said, "Behold, I come to do your will." He has taken away the old sacrifice and replaced it with himself. The new sacrifice involves heart: having the intent to do God's will.

Because Jesus came into the world, Hebrews says, "We have been consecrated through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ." We celebrate the birth of Jesus this week, but we also celebrate our consecration as the people of God. In thanksgiving, let us resolve to do God's will.

fulfill some greater dream, some greater call. When you think about it, this isn't that different from the story of St. Joseph.

I wonder if St. Joseph ever knew, like George Bailey, the frustrations, and anger, and temptations of life.

The other night, for the umpteenth time, they were showing "It's a Wonderful Life" on TV. It is rightfully considered a classic. But, to me, it is more than a Christmas movie.

It is an Advent movie. It is a movie about expectations and dreams. It's a movie about waiting for a future that seems never to come - and it's a story about finding, in the end, redemption.

Significantly, as we draw closer to Christmas, it reminds us of how one life can make a difference in the world.

When I was watching it the other night, I noticed something that had escaped me the other times I'd seen it. Moments into the movie, after the opening credits, the first name you hear mentioned is George Bailey.

St. Joseph. His name is invoked in a prayer. And from that moment on, "It's a Wonderful Life" becomes the story of a "righteous man" and an angel. It becomes a parable of sacrifice and self-denial, of generosity and love, the story of a man who spends his life providing for others, forsaking whatever dreams he might have had so that he can

And I think he probably did. He was human. He was flawed. He was probably prone to doubt, and anger, and selfishness, and sin - just like all of us. He may have spent a lot of his time praying for patience, or a job, or good health - just as we all do. He may well have known fear and even despair.

But more importantly St. Joseph also knew trust. And though he never uttered a word in the gospels, he spoke eloquently with his actions. St. Joseph listened and he responded to what he heard. He dared to believe the unbelievable and surrender his doubt to God, taking to heart the message of an angel.

And not just any message. Joseph took a leap of faith, echoing Mary's own Magnificat: "I am the servant of the Lord. Be it done to me according to your word." And as a result of this moment, a family was formed - a Holy Family. God's great plan could be fulfilled.

Isn't it that way with all of us?

God's work can only be accomplished, his will can only be fulfilled, when we give our assent. We are called, like Joseph, to cooperate with God and to collaborate with him in his plan.

We are called to fulfill a dream: God's dream for us.

Doing that often demands the hardest thing many of us can muster: trust.

But all we need to do is turn our eyes toward the manger to be reminded of what that kind of trust can accomplish.

All we need is to raise our eyes toward the consecrated host to realize, with a humbling clarity, what can come from dreaming, and listening, and responding to the will of God.

Do we do that? Can we even try?

These final hours of Advent offer us an opportunity to make ourselves fully ready for God to enter our world.

But Advent also asks us to do something more than prepare the way of the Lord. It asks us to do what St. Joseph did: to prepare ourselves for God's will for our lives.

Pray that we learn from Joseph's example. Seize these days. Make them matter. Prepare. Get to confession. Find time for quiet reflection away from the noise and the distractions and the stress of the season. Listen. And trust.

We need to make ourselves ready for Christ - the life that came into the world and gave new life to all of us!

If we had any doubts, the approach of Christmas reminds us: *that* truly IS a wonderful life - the most wonderful, in fact, of all.

I don't know about you, but I have been in Walmart about 30 times in the past week. Honestly, I should own stock in it by now. With 3 children under 7, the holidays have become a marathon. Beginning with a runner's perfect pace, I promise myself that THIS YEAR will be the year I have everything together. Cool as a cucumber, I will NOT let Christmas beat me! Yet without fail, somewhere around the 2nd week of Advent, I panic. My pace becomes more of a mad dash, and I quickly hit the wall physically and emotionally. Between working full time, school parties, after school activities, capturing the perfect family picture in matching outfits, trying to remember that my husband does in fact want to TALK to me sometimes, and questioning, "DID I MOVE THE ELF?", and, "WHEN was the last time I washed my hair?", I am left feeling completely inadequate and exhausted.

SOMEWHERE off in the distance I see someone standing at the finishing line: Jesus born in a manger to save us; to save ME.
But instead of my focus being on

Him, it is on all of the million other little details, stress and pressure that I have put on myself. Even going to Church with 3 tired kids in tow becomes just one more thing that we need to do and fit into our schedules...and I WORK for the Church for crying out loud!

So honestly, if you make it a priority to come to Church this Christmas, THANK YOU. No, we do not care that daughter's leggings have a tear in them, or that you had to argue with your son for 10 minutes to put his shoes on. We don't care that your child is crying in Mass, and neither does Jesus!

As inadequate as you may feel, REST in the peaceful assurance that Jesus LOVES you unconditionally! He loves you SO much that He humbled Himself and became human to save you from your sin so that you could be with Him forever! You don't need to be perfect for Jesus. He loves you as HIS child that HE created, and He strongly desires for you to simply come to Him as you are in full surrender.

This Christmas, surrender all of your stress and anxiety to Jesus! When we surrender to Jesus, our lives are by no means suddenly perfect, but they become perfectly imperfect! We will NEVER be perfect for Jesus, but knowing that His love is nothing but pure GRACE gives us the freedom to keep our eyes fixed on the ONE that will NEVER leave our side.


