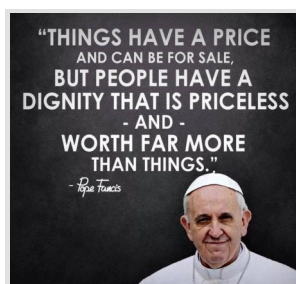


St. John's 125th Anniversary/Fundraising Committee will meet on TUE, JUL 7, at 6:30pm in Moravek Hall.

When I was young, I could never understand why the family car was not the top-of-the-line model. When that car finally needed to be replaced, it was with a similar low-on-the-line model. Again, I couldn't understand. It wasn't until I was older that I finally came to the realization that my parents were saving money so that my sister and I could have special things, like a Catholic school education. That knowledge explained a lot of things that had been a mystery to me previously.

That scenario is often repeated in our lives. We often have misconceptions about why people do what they do, or why they are the way they are. We forget a grouchy person may be ill; that a "loner" may never have known love in his or her life; that a frightened person may never have had the security and comfort of a loving family.

We often see behavior in others that we cannot understand because we don't know the reason behind it. Because of this, we should not judge. All we can do is offer our love, and if there is any need of change in yourself or another, such love may be the needed catalyst for that change for the better.



I would like to address at this time, primarily the parishioners of St. Aloysius, with an important announcement....

With the help and guidance of the finance committee of your parish, and Susan, our parish Business Manager, we were able to sell 7 acres of our property behind the Padre Pio Shrine (a good ways behind - down in the dip located there). With the proceeds from that sale, we were able to pay off our debt (unpaid Diocesan assessments) and thus as of June 30, 2020, we have no debt, liens or otherwise back bills owed to the Diocese of Greensburg. And with the left-over we are able to give us some breathing room in our checking account. I thank all of you who have helped in any way over the past few years with your guidance, understanding and generosity, to bring us to this point. Thank you and may God bless you.

I do thank you for helping us to reach our DLA goal also. I know that I said that any money over that goal would go to the debt, but since that cause has been remedied, a new project has materialized. Since all money received now will come to the parish, we can use this money to have 3 pine trees that are dead, to be removed. One is situated at the point of the driveway coming in and 2 are to the left of the Padre Pio Shrine. This project will greatly beautify our grounds. If you were waiting for a good cause to donate to, our DLA would be it.

Please know that all 4 of our parishes have reached their DLA goals and all monies received now will remain in our parishes for our special projects. Please pray about it and make a gift today if you haven't already. Thank you.

And once more, CONGRATULATIONS TO ST. ALOYSIUS PARISH and the parishioners for once again being debt-free. May God continue to bless you! FR. Paul

SAT, JUL 11 is the Feast of St. Benedict (ABBOT, Religious Founder (c.480-550))

In some ways, the 6th century was a lot like the 21st. People were afraid of strangers. The rich didn't speak to the poor. People within the same social class competed with one another for status by showing off their wealth and possessions.

Benedict taught people a way to use prayer and Christ-like attitudes to get over their fear and mistrust of each other.

Benedict was born to a noble family of northern Italy. The Roman Empire was breaking apart. Invading tribes from beyond its border had been taking over the land and looting cities. Many people lived with no thought of the future.

In those years, people who wanted to be close to God often gave up on society altogether. They would find an isolated place and spend the rest of their lives there. So for several years,



Benedict became a hermit. He lived in a cave on a high cliff that was almost impossible to get to. Over time people heard about him, and many came to join him. Around the year 530, Benedict founded a monastery called Monte Cassino. Everyone in the community lived under one roof. To help them Benedict wrote a common-sense guide called the *Rule of Life*. It divided the day into times of prayer, study, work and rest. St. Scholastica, Benedict's sister, settled nearby and formed the first community of women to use Benedict's rule.

In these communities, everyone worked and no one kept personal

possessions. This helped prevent envy and pride. Benedict encouraged a spirit of generous forgiveness which was also extended to strangers and the needy. Every visitor to the abbey was treated like Christ. No one was ever turned away. Hospitality is still a trademark of Benedictine communities around the world.

Benedict spent his life leading his monks, counseling visitors in the abbey and caring for the sick who lived nearby. When he died he was buried with Scholastica at Monte Cassino.

Benedictine monks and nuns would later be given credit for preserving European civilization during the Middle Ages. Benedict was named Patron Saint of Europe.

We congratulate the Benedictine community at St. Vincent in Latrobe on the feast of their founder. We also thank them for their service to our diocese, parishes and seminarians over the years.

Zechariah 9:9-10
TRUSTING IN HUMILITY**

The dream for world peace ever stirs the heart of humanity. Imagine a world where nations stopped their aggression, where terrorists laid down their weapons of mass destruction, and where nations respected one another's territories and customs.

Closer to home, imagine a neighborhood where people got along, where diversity was treasured, and where violence was no more. We all long for the security that comes from peace.

Many nations, however, still hold that peace comes from a well-built arsenal. Leaders believe that a

strong defense inhibits aggression and causes the desired peace.

But the prophet Zechariah envisions another kind of leader. He sees one who is just, who rescues people from their oppression. Meek, he rides a simple beast of burden, and yet his dominion extends all across the world. This leader accomplishes the desired gift of peace not from weapons, not from intimidation, but from the example of humility.

Our leaders will continue to put their trust in weapons as long as we do too. If we live in trust, we can build a place where peace will reign. Imagine the world at peace. Imagine it starting with you.

This is something that we need not do alone, for the burden is often too heavy for us to carry by ourselves. Who, then, do we turn to? We can turn to the Body of Christ - the community of disciples gathered for worship. When we find the burden too heavy, let us remember that we can share that burden with our Christian sisters and brothers, who can help bring us rest.
